### We Did It!!!



In July 2017, we reached the goal of \$16,000US for the purchase of a vehicle for Bp Andrew, Ordinary for the Continuing Anglican Church in Zambia (CACZ). This diesel powered Ford Ranger will greatly aid the bishop in his travels throughout Zambia as he continues to build an Anglican presence in that country.



*Bp. Andrew Mukuyamba's Ford Ranger Pickup Truck* Our target date for this project was reached several weeks early. Not only has the truck been purchased, but \$2100US additional funds have also been set aside in a savings account. They are available to the bishop for other than routine maintenance. The folks in Zambia will be responsible for routine maintenance, gas, oil, etc. As of this writing, final paperwork is being completed so that the bishop may take possession of his "chariot." ### **Current Projects**

URRENTLY, the Fellowship is providing financial support for seven projects. All of these involve missionary efforts for clergy and churches that are members of the Traditional Anglican Communion (TAC).

### Traditional Anglo-Catholic Latin American Province (TACLAP)

Based in Guatemala, Bishop Ruben Rodriguez, despite ill health, continues to travel extensively throughout Guatemala and other countries in Central America, training and mentoring new priests, coordinating church-related activities for children, conducting mass, confirming new church members, and coordinating construction of new church buildings.

Bishop Rodriguez has been serving that part of the world for over 28 years. The TACLAP contains approximately forty congregations.

The vast majority of congregants are extremely poor and they place a great deal of faith in the church. The IAF helps out with a monthly grant to Bp Rodriguez. Part of this grant helps pay for the bishop's essential medications, the remainder supports his clerical efforts and ministry.

### Continuing Anglican Communion in Zambia (CACZ)

Andrew Mukuyamba Bp. is the ecclesiastical leader of this diocese and is also the sponsor for the IAF project. Headquartered in Lusaka, Zambia, the diocese contains congregations 19 averaging 150members each. Supporting an organization of that size and geographic disbursement with 5 priests and 3 deacons in a country suffering from widespread poverty must be quite a challenge. Yet Bp. Andrew presses on by continuing to build new churches, repair and maintain older ones, while supplying clergy with the sacramental necessities. Bp Andrew reports that things are as busy as ever in the CACZ:

Here is Bishop Andrew's most recent description of the situation in Zambia:

As the year comes to a close, we thank God for His faithfulness, love and favour upon His people. In the year 2017 we have experienced amazing blessings and we are encouraged to press on toward the goal. We are grateful to God and to you all, our brothers and sisters in Christ in our Communion, the TAC and beyond who have faithfully prayed for us and have given your time and resources. We have been able to reach out to those who needed spiritual, financial and material help because of your support to us.

The church CACZ is steadily growing. Between 2015 and 2017 we have seen significant growth in terms of spirituality, commitment and numbers. We have been able to conduct a number of activities in places that are a distance away from Lusaka.

Since the consecration of a Bishop for the Diocese of Zambia in October 2015, a good number of members of the church have been confirmed and now hopeful that the church has potential to grow even more. Our thanks go to the College of Bishops and the IAF for their support and guidance.

The Youth Fellowship held their end of year conference from  $12^{th}$  to  $17^{th}$ December 2017 at the Cathedral Church of the Good Shepherd, Makeni in Lusaka. A total of 230 young people from all parishes attended the conference.

It was a well-organized conference and a number of topics were taught which included: Salvation, Ministry of the Holy Spirit, Identifying Spiritual Gifts, Importance of Christian Fellowship, Stewardship, Leadership, and How to be a Responsible Citizen. The youth raised their own funds to hold the conference to the delight of the church leadership.

In August 2017 the Bishop and two priests travelled to the Eastern Province with a group of 30 men and women from Lusaka; and were joined by 30 men and women from Petauke Parish and 25 men and women from Msoro Parish to Katete 530 kilometres where some thev participated in the service of unveiling of the Tombstone of one of the church's key leaders who died in a road accident along the Great East Road in 2014; and also in the evangelistic outreach to that area. Many people who were not Christians committed their lives to Jesus Christ. Plans are underway to visit the area again, God willing. See some pictures below:

We also thank the Anglican Church in Southern Africa (ACSA) under the leadership of Bishop Michael Gill for their support in many other areas. The support we have received and we keep receiving has helped us in our work of mission and would evangelism. It have been impossible to achieve what we have achieved in the last few years without the support from TAC and IAF. We say to both TAC and IAF that your investment is not in vain. We have seen the fruit of your work. We also thank all those who have worked very hard to raise funds to purchase the vehicle for the Bishop in Particularly the IAF for Zambia. spearheading the project. The vehicle is not yet in Zambia but we are hopeful

that it will arrive in Zambia after all the hurdles of import duties are sorted out.

With the funds we receive from IAF and what we raise locally when we are able. we have embarked on the project of constructing church buildings in rural areas where we have most congregations. In Eastern Province, we have been able to construct three church buildings. in Central Province we have constructed another three buildings and in Lusaka. building under church isone construction. It is our hope that this building will reach an advanced stage before the rains get too heavy. Our young people are also busy fundraising for new musical equipment to help them in their singing.

It is our prayer that the good Lord will keep us all safe, blessed and encouraged as we share our life of faith together and do His work here on earth in the year 2018.

May the Spirit of God always lead us all.

### The Anglican Church in India (ACI)

For many decades, Indian Christians and followers of other non-Hindu religious beliefs have been marginalized and even physically attacked by members of a nationalist movement. strong Hindu Violence has increased dramatically during the last decade and has included burning of churches. forced the "reconversions" to Hinduism, bomb threats. distribution of threatening literature, burning of Bibles, destruction of property at Christian schools, colleges,

and cemeteries, and the murder of priests and other Christian workers. Through all of this discord, Archbishop Samuel Prakash, Metropolitan of the ACI, works to keep a Christian presence alive and functioning. The IAF provides a monthly missionary grant to Abp Prakash to assist him in his efforts. Funding provides scholarships for Christian students in their primary classes, for families in need, and also helps fund an annual youth camp.

Following is an update from Archbishop Prakash:

The 2017 Anglican youth camp was held from June 11 through June 15, 2017 under the leadership of Revd. Canon John Ashish at St. Peter's Church compound, Vikasnagar, Dehradun.

The camp began on Trinity Sunday a total of 55 campers gathering to learn and share biblical knowledge, strengthen and learn the traditional Anglican faith and its doctrine. It was an atmosphere of all joys and presence of Lord was felt by each one who visited. The campers stayed as a one big Anglican Family building strong spiritual connection with the Lord while participating in the biblical activities. First day activities included introduction of all the leaders of the camp and for the new campers an introduction of the Anglican Church of India, Anglican faith, and relation of the ACI with the world wide Traditional Anglican Communion.

The campers returned home with strong friendship and memorable bible learning experiences. Although, the camp was ended, it was the beginning of change of lives of these young campers with a strong Anglican Christian faith. The Anglican Youth of India are also thankful for the contribution made by the IAF for the annual Anglican Youth Camp. We continue to work towards strengthening of the Anglican Church in India and Anglican Traditional Communion worldwide. Hope you enjoy this report.

#### The Anglican Church in Southern Africa



Southern Africa is very poor with large numbers of unemployed (about 45% of the population) and many refugees from neighbouring states who have poured into South Africa. Political turmoil and bad governance in neighbouring countries has created a huge problem of poverty and many people live well below breadline in sprawling shack the communities on the edges of the cities. HIV and AIDS are rampant amongst these communities. As the Bishop of Southern Africa, Bishop Michael Gill has ecclesiastical responsibility for nine countries and IAF contributions help him support what can only be described as a "monumental" effort.

Here is Bp Michael's report on some of the recent events in Southern Africa:

#### CONSECRATION AT ALL SAINTS', POLOKWANE

Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> November 2017, the Feast of All Saints, saw the next step forward in the planned growth and development of the Traditional Anglican Communion in Southern Africa. Bishop Wellington Murinda was Consecrated as Suffragan Bishop for Southern Africa, with great rejoicing, witnessed by all the clergy of South Africa, many from Zimbabwe, and a strong contingent from Zambia. Lay representatives from all our South African parishes attended, many having travelled hundreds of miles to get to Polokwane. There was also a good lay representation from Zimbabwe.

It was a well-coordinated event, allowing for rich fellowship, and wonderful combined worship in many of the languages of our Sub-Continent. It was a day of fulfilment and joy, and one which allowed our people to see the vision of our Diocese, set some nine years ago, coming to fruition.

The Consecration of Bishop Wellington means that we have achieved our goal of a strong House of Bishops for Southern Africa well within our set time. We have recognised and raised up excellent local leadership and now have three African Bishops in place to serve God's people of the TAC. In the early days, we had to rely on visiting Bishops (for which we will be ever grateful) but now, the growth and responsibility has passed to competent African leaders. Our thanks go to the College of Bishops of the Traditional Anglican Communion for 1) understanding our vision, and 2) giving us their support in the growth and development of the Southern African TAC. Our thanks also go to the International Anglican Fellowship, whose support for mission and evangelism has helped us so enormously over the years. I am quite confident that the investment of time and resources in Southern Africa has borne rich and plenteous fruit, and the global TAC will continue to see an organised and sustained growth in this part of Our Lord's Vinevard.

This event ushers in a new period of accelerated growth for the Traditional Anglican Communion in Southern Africa. We have our policies in place to manage a careful and sustainable church growth, and for the TAC in Southern Africa, the future is very bright indeed, as we follow Our Lord Jesus Christ and obey His most Holy Will.

### Diocese of Puerto Rico and the Caribbean

The Anglican missionary efforts in the Dominican Republic, under the able leadership of Bishop Juan Garcia, have taken root and are growing. For the last five years, the IAF has been actively involved by providing a portion of the financial support necessary to sustain these missions. Here is Bp. Garcia's update:

The missionary work in the Dominican Republic continues under the care of Father Fanfi Antonio Dominguez.



At Church in the Dominican Republic Father Fanfi has a family of 5 and works for the Water Authority in the Dominican Republic. He serves two missions: Our Lady of Carmen and San Miguel (Saint These two missions are far Michael). apart. He goes to Our Lady of Carmen in the morning and in the afternoon to Saint Michael. He uses public transportation to commute from one place to the other because he doesn't have a car.

Saint Miguel is a mission basically composed of Haitian immigrants in the Dominican Republic, very poor areas. Your contributions to support this work have been key to the success of our efforts. Without it, it would have been impossible. Thank you very much for your help, support, and contributions.

### <u>Special Update on the Hurricane Maria</u> <u>Relief Effort for the DPRC</u>

In September, 2017, Hurricane Maria ravaged many of the islands in the Caribbean. Puerto Rico was especially hard hit. As of this writing, recovery efforts are ongoing, albeit slowly due to the extent of the damage.



Thankfully, none of our brothers and sisters was injured. However, property damage was widespread and thorough. Services, including utilities, were shut down. Unfortunately, many of those problems still exist although the island is gradually recovering.



It began at the 2017 Joint Anglican Joint Synods conference held in Atlanta, Georgia in early October. Over 500 people attended this event and many of them contributed to a hastily organized relief fund for the DPRC. Here are a few examples of the generosity in evidence at the Joint Synod:

•Sales of Joint Synod souvenir coffee mugs.

•Offering from the Joint Synods Pontifical Mass.

•Individual contributions from Synod attendees.



On the heels of this disaster, and not unexpectedly, Anglicans outside of the DPRC have come together *en masse* to provide financial assistance to the folks in the DPRC.





Since October 2017, additional generous support has been offered by individuals, church groups, Anglican jurisdictions that are members of the Traditional Anglican Communion (e.g., the Anglican Catholic Church of Canada(ACCC)) as well as non-members, such as the Anglican Catholic Church (ACC) and the Anglican Province of America (APA) from throughout North America. The list of contributors is too lengthy to include here....but suffice it to say that it is very diverse. The IAF office served as a "pass through" for many of the donated funds.



The advantage has been that no overhead or administrative charges are required for the handling and transfer of funds. To date the Fellowship has funneled over **\$24,770 US** to Bp Garcia. This is in addition to **\$12,077 US** sent to BP Garcia from sources outside the IAF. That means that over **\$36,850 US** has been collected to help out the folks in the DPRC! Truly incredible! The bishop has been purchasing water, food, and electricity generators for his parishioners in need. For more information on the list of contributors, contact Erv Lischke at iafoffice@wildblue.net.

Fr. David McCready, rector of St. Francis of Assisi Anglican Church in Estes Park, Colorado, has taken the lead in reestablishing the mission. Both the DMV and the IAF are providing financial support: The Fellowship has assumed responsibility for the mission's monthly electric bill.

Here is Fr. McCready's description of the current situation at Sun Star:

Sun Star Church continues to hold its own. It remains a small group, one with many material needs, but there is a firm desire to make things succeed, a desire evinced not least by Reader Darrell Locke, Fr Apple's grandson, who now leads the church. Unfortunately, in August, Darrell and his sister Christie received a personal blow through the death of their mother, Fr Apple's daughter, Nevis. Her funeral however, was a wonderful occasion. which saw the whole community come together to support her grief-struck family. It is a reminder that what the Lakota lack in material things, they make up for by their rich spirituality.

The mission of Dress a Girl Around the World is to "elevate the esteem of girls around the world by making sure every little girl has the dignity of owning at least one dress." Volunteers from several countries sew new dresses that are then distributed to underprivileged and at-risk girls of all ages. To date, over 200,000 dresses have been sent to 65 countries. Girls in Zambia were the first group that the IAF supported. Bp. Andrew Mukuyamba, was our coordinator.

At the present time, there have been no immediate requests for dresses in either the US or in other countries. However, the Fellowship will remain prepared to assist where we can should the need arise. Please log onto the Dress a Girl website:

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#### Spotlight on a Sustaining Member.....



The Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist, Victoria, British Columbia Anglican Catholic Church of Canada • Traditional Anglican Communion has been an extremely active member of the Sustaining Member program since its inception in 2012.



What was to become the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist of the Anglican Catholic Church of Canada (Traditional Anglican Communion) had its beginnings in 1977, following the conference of Concerned Churchmen at St. Louis. Missouri, and the formulation of the Affirmation of St. Louis. From that conference, the first Continuing Anglican Church in Canada was established in Victoria, B.C., named the Parish of Saint Athanasius (later to be renamed the Parish of Saint John the Evangelist).

The newly formed Parish grew slowly but steadily, meeting first in the home of Mary Wilkinson. Due to the growing congregation, arrangements were made to rent space from Grace Lutheran Church in Victoria; and the first public Mass of the new Parish of St. Athanasius was celebrated in that church on Advent Sunday, November 27, 1977. Thereafter, the Holy Eucharist was celebrated every Sunday, before an ever-growing congregation.

As 1986 progressed it became increasingly evident that the Parish could not continue indefinitely in rented premises, and steps were taken to secure a church building. In September 1987, a Mennonite Meeting Hall on Falmouth Road (formerly an Anglican mission church built in the 1930s) came on the market, and was subsequently purchased by the Parish, with possession assumed on October 31, 1987. The first Mass was celebrated on All Saints Day, 1987. The Parish was renamed Saint John the Evangelist, in memory of Father Roland Ford Palmer, SSJE (who had left the Anglican Church of Canada, moved to Victoria, and joined the Parish in the early '80s). In January 2005, the Parish was elevated to the status of Cathedral Church for the ACCC.

Since its foundation forty years ago, the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist has been served by three Rectors: (former bishop) Peter Wilkinson (1977-1991), Canon Stanley Sinclair (1991-1997), and (the now Archbishop) Shane Janzen (1997-present). Archbishop Janzen is assisted in the ministry at the Cathedral by two Honorary Assistant Curates: The Reverend Jack Archbold and The Reverend Douglas Ohs; together with the Regional Dean, Canon Richard Root. Through the years, the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist has hosted the TAC College of Bishops, ACCC Synods, an international Eucharistic Congress, and various memorial and

national civic commemorations. Parishioners range from tots to teenagers, young adults, married couples, singles, the middle-aged and the retired. All are active in the life of the Church. The congregation continues to grow and is diverse both in terms of ages and backgrounds. Many special events and milestones in our Cathedral Parish have marked the past forty years but it is the regular worship and fellowship activities that have always been a key part of our parish life. These include our Patronal Festival celebrations; Baptisms, Confirmations, Weddings, Anniversaries, Ordinations, and Funerals; Thursday Bible classes and other church studies; retreat days; potluck dinners, BBQs, picnics. and garden parties; Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners; concerts and recitals. We also reach out to the local community through church open houses, rummage sales, bazaars, and the use of the Church Hall for community groups and associations.

and blessing, By God's grace the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist continues to grow, to witness, and to reach out to the Greater Victoria area and beyond, offering Bible-based, Christ-centred traditional Anglican worship, faith and fellowship. A small church in size but large in Christian faith, warmth and welcome. May God continue to bless His Church in this Cathedral Parish; and may its members remain steadfast in the faith once delivered to the saints.
