A Partnership at Work







Last summer the IAF, the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist (ACCC), and members of the Diocese of the West (ACA) joined forces to help provide a little relief with three shipments of non-perishable food to our brothers and sisters at St. Mary's Anglican Church in the beleaguered country of Venezuela. The first totalled 160 pounds and was sent by air from Toronto, Canada in August of 2018. It was coordinated and funded by the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Evangelist in Victoria, British Columbia who also sent a second shipment totalling 320 pounds in January of 2019. The third, weighing 240 pounds, was sponsored by the IAF and the Diocese of the West. It was sent by sea from Los Angeles, California and successfully arrived in Caracas. A total of 720 pounds of foodstuffs was shipped. If the political situation permits, a follow-on shipment is planned for early this year.

Current Projects

URRENTLY, the Fellowship is providing financial support for seven missionary projects. All of these involve missionary efforts for clergy and churches that are members of the Traditional Anglican Communion (TAC).

Traditional Anglo-Catholic Latin American Province (TACLAP)

Based in Guatemala, Bishop Ruben Rodriguez, despite ill health, continues to travel extensively throughout Guatemala and other countries in Central America, training and mentoring new priests, coordinating church-related activities for children, conducting mass, confirming new church members, and coordinating construction of new church buildings. Bishop Rodriguez has been serving that part of the world for over 28 years.

The TACLAP contains approximately forty congregations. The vast majority of congregants are extremely poor and they place a great deal of faith in the church.

The IAF helps out with a monthly grant to Bishop Rodriguez. Part of this grant helps pay for the bishop's essential medications, the remainder supports his clerical efforts and ministry.

Continuing Anglican Communion in Zambia (CACZ)

Bishop Andrew Mukuyamba is the ecclesiastical leader of this Diocese and is also the sponsor for the IAF project. Headquartered in Lusaka, Zambia, the Diocese contains 19 congregations averaging 150 members Supporting an organization of that size and geographic dispersement with 5 priests and 3 deacons in a country suffering from widespread poverty must be quite a challenge.

Yet Bishop Mukuyamba presses on by continuing to build new churches, repair and maintain older ones, while supplying clergy with the sacramental necessities.

The Anglican Church in India (ACI)

For many decades, Indian Christians and followers of other non-Hindu religious beliefs have been marginalized and even physically attacked by members of a strong Hindu nationalist movement. Violence has increased dramatically during the last decade and has included the burning of churches, forced "reconversions" to Hinduism, bomb threats, distribution of threatening literature, burning of Bibles, destruction of property Christian schools, colleges, cemeteries, and the murder of priests and other Christian workers. Through all of this discord, Archbishop Samuel Prakash, Metropolitan of the ACI, works to keep a Christian presence alive and functioning. The IAF provides a monthly missionary grant to Archbishop Prakash to assist him in his efforts. Funding provides scholarships for Christian students in their primary classes, for families in need, and also helps fund an annual youth camp.

The ACI began its support program, "Come Join Hands for the Poor and Needy", in 2014. Since that time, it has awarded scholarships and provided financial assistance and clothes to many children. During 2018, much needed items such as beds, mattresses, bed sheets, slippers, school shoes, sewing machines, folding chairs, room heaters, clothes and toys, among other things were distributed. Contributions from the IAF helped to fund this project.

The Anglican missionary efforts in the Dominican Republic, under the able leadership of Bishop Juan Garcia, have taken root and are growing. For the last six years, the IAF has been actively involved by providing a portion of the financial support necessary to sustain these missions. Here is Bishop Garcia's update:

The missionary work in the Dominican Republic continues under the care of Father Fanfi Antonio Dominguez. Father Fanfi has a family of 5 and works for the Water Authority in the Dominican Republic. He serves two missions: Our Lady of Carmen and San Miguel (Saint Michael).

These two missions are far apart. goes to Our Lady of Carmen in the morning and in the afternoon to Saint Michael. He uses public transportation to commute from one place to the other because he doesn't have a car. Saint Miguel is a mission basically composed of Haitian immigrants in the Dominican Republic, very poor areas. Your contributions to support this work have been key to the success of our efforts. would have been Without it. itimpossible. Thank you very much for your help, support, and contributions.

Spotlight on a Sustaining Member

From Rev Aird:

I was born and lived in the very outskirts of London (in Upminster Essex). My parents – very good ones – were only nominally Christian and although my brother and sister were sent to Sunday school and church, it was primarily to give Mum and Dad time off.

During the beginning of the war, I was evacuated to Gloucestershire and the war had no real impact on me.

We returned to London in 1943 in time for the mini-blitz doodle bugs and V2 rockets but, where we were, we were not that greatly affected.

My own "conversion" occurred when I was 15 when — quite suddenly and unexpectedly, I was convinced God was important and have at the least, attended church ever since.

When I completed school and, after two years in the National Service where I was trained as a telecommunications mechanic, I went to college and gained my degree in Civil Engineering. I was now more active in the Church, being a Sunday School teacher and a member of the Parochial Church Council.

It was in 1958 that I started courting Elizabeth and we married in 1960. Since then, she has been a huge supporter and encourager in everything we have done.

I was an Associate and then a full member of the Institution of Civil Engineers. Along the way, I changed professions and began teaching math.

Elizabeth, myself, and our three sons moved to the West Country where I continued teaching math as head of the local Math Department.

It was during this time that our Vicar asked me to consider becoming a Reader. I agreed and, for several years, I was very active taking services or preaching virtually every week. When our new Vicar approached me in 1975 to ask if I would consider becoming ordained, I was immediately convinced that this would be the right thing to do. After a two year "Geriatric" General Ordination Course, I was ordained Deacon in 1977, appointed Curate in Burnham on Sea, and then priested in 1978.

I served at St Peter's in Taunton until 1987 and became Rector of All Saints Dulverton Somerset where I stayed until 1994. Eventually, the Church of England became too liberal for my comfort so I resigned and, with help from Bp Louis Falk, established a new parish in Dulverton...St Phillip and St James, the first service being held on May 1, 1994. After more than 20 years we have still a smallbutvery faithful community. Although we do not know what the future holds, so long as we try to do what is right and leave to Him to sort things out, as St Julian of Norwich once said, "All will be well, and all will be well, and all will be very well.

The Very Reverend Merrill Perkins

The Very Reverend Merrill Raymond Perkins was born on July 6, 1956, in Austin, Minnesota, the first child of Raymond and Nancy (Merrill) Perkins. When he was age 2, the young family moved to Old Saybrook, Connecticut, where his maternal grandfather, the Reverend Edward R. Merrill, was Rector of Grace Episcopal Church.

Father Perkins was educated in the Old Saybrook Public School system, also attended Xavier High School Middletown, Connecticut, from whence he graduated on June 4, 1974. Two years later, he was hired on with Amtrak in New Haven, Connecticut. During his 40plus year career there, he worked at a variety of clerical positions, including Locomotive Dispatcher, Ticket Ticket Receiver. Clerk/Agent. and Drawbridge Tender. He retired from Amtrak on December 29, 2016.

On May 17, 1980, he was wed to Jennifer Jane Wood of Poughkeepsie, New York. They have two children, John and Sarah, who both reside the the area of Chattanooga, Tennessee. Jennifer has been severely afflicted with Multiple Sclerosis for many years, and has been in nursing care for over 13 years.

Father Perkins was baptized by his grandfather in Minnesota, and was raised in the Episcopal Church. A lifelong and active churchman, he committed to the Anglican Church in America (ACA) while an observer at the Diocese of the Northeast (DNE) Synod in Conway, New Hampshire, on October 2, 2009.

Five weeks later, he was accepted as a Postulant for Holy Orders, and in December of that year commenced studies in the Diaconal Track at Logos House of Theological Studies. He was licensed as a Lay Reader in the DNE on April 30, 2010 and in late May was asked by Bishop Brian Marsh to resume services as a Lay Missioner at St. Matthias Church in Mystic, Connecticut.

A few previous congregants began to attend again, and several new folks joined the community. On July 16, 2011, he was made a Deacon at St. Matthias Church, and was ordained a Priest on December 20, 2014.

Father Perkins' gift for administration have been recognized following his organization of the DNE Synods held in Mystic in 2013 and 2016, and the House Bishops and Executive Council meetings held in Mystic in September 2015. At the 2013 DNE Synod, the then Deacon Perkins, was elected to the Diocesan Standing Committee, on which he still serves. In September of 2015 he was asked to assume the duties of convening the DNE Clericus retreats. In July of 2016 he was asked to serve as Diocesan Steward for the International Anglican Fellowship. In March of 2017 he was appointed to fill a Clerical vacancy on the ACA Executive Council, and was elected to a 3-year term in October of that year. Most recently, he was appointed as Area Dean in the DNE, covering Southern New England and Eastern New York State. Many hats the good Reverend wears, all in joyful service to our Lord Jesus Christ and His Church!


