Dear Friends in Christ,

During our recent Board Meeting of the International Anglican Fellowship, I announced that I plan to step down as Board President at the end of this year. Over ten years ago, during an unsettled time in both the Anglican Church in America and the Traditional Anglican Communion, I was elected President of the IAF Board of Directors. When I assumed office, funds were at an all-time low, largely because lay and clerical members of the ACA were reluctant to give money to an organization that might enter the Roman Catholic Ordinariate, but also because of the perceived irregularities in the use of IAF funds.

Because of my long service, Father Ihde has asked that I write a column for this issue of *The Mission*, reflecting upon the story of the IAF during the past decade. For many, I suspect this history will be interesting indeed.

At the time of my election, the IAF was in crisis mode. Annual contributions had dropped to just over \$2,000. Not only had it become

impossible for the IAF to fulfill its mission, the question of its very survival hung in the balance. Fortunately, we overcame these challenges largely because of the appointment of a new Executive Director, but also because we worked hard to restore faith in the IAF.

Shortly before Erv Lischke became Executive Director in 2013, the Board revamped its By-Laws. In order to maintain the highest level of integrity, we established the rule that Board membership would be restricted to those clergy and lay representatives of the TAC whose churches did not receive direct stipends or grants from the IAF. We also stipulated that no IAF funds be used to cover travel expenses. This had become a serious issue in previous years, when church leadership would routinely bill the IAF for international travel costs.

Erv Lischke, who served as Executive Director for nine years, introduced several programs that helped restore confidence in the IAF. The Sustaining Member program, for example, continues to provide a steady, reliable resource for our international missions. Because of our Sustaining Member contributions, we can more easily plan for mission support several months in advance.

Two years ago, Erv chose to retire as Executive Director. He had achieved a great deal during his time in office. As an experienced leader, he knew that providing for an effective transition to the next Executive Director would be essential. He and I share this view: it is not enough for us to succeed in building a thriving

organization, it is also necessary for us to prepare for the future. Good leaders recruit and train their successors.

God has indeed been good to us. Father Ed Ihde volunteered to assume the responsibility of serving as Executive Director. Father Ihde has brought many gifts to this office. His commitment to mission is evidenced by the many projects he had undertaken in third world countries. Under his editorial expertise, "The Mission" has become an outstanding publication, one that displays the considerable work the IAF does throughout the world. He and Erv Lischke effected a smooth and virtually seamless transition between directors. It is the kind of transition that can occur when two devout Christians work faithfully to do the work of the church in a humble, prayerful and cooperative manner.

During the next several months, The Board and I will begin the process of electing the next President of the IAF Board. I am certain that God will send us an able, godly and committed individual who will help guide this wonderful organization into the future.

In closing, I would simply offer that it has been an honor to serve this fine organization over the past decade. The Board has offered the sincere commitment to mission that has fostered stability, integrity and growth. It is now time for me to embrace the fullness of my role as a Sustaining Member of The International Anglican Fellowship.

Our Mission:

The people of the Church of the "Saint Mary's Cathedral" (The Anglican Church of Caracas), follow the light of Christ in our daily lives, coming to Him with the gifts of our own unique treasures and talents as Catholic individuals. We have met with the direction of the Holy Spirit as church to evaluate our work, to share our worries and to look for solutions to improve our work.

**The Church for Spring 2023, Report of pastoral activities from our Deacon Freddy Liendo:**



We began with the month of September, on the 8th Her Majesty Elizabeth II died, it is good to remember that our Church "St. Mary's" was built by the English-speaking community in Vene-

zuela, and the diplomatic delegation of the United Kingdom receives particular attention, I was present at the Embassy, and thus closed the Book of Condolences, we also did a modest and simple corresponding liturgical religious service in our temple, which also served as a reunion between the English and Spanish speaking communities, including those who had not attended our facilities for a long time.

Some of our parishioners have continued to be absent, expressing different reasons, the most common being physical distancing and protecting their health in the face of new outbreaks of the COVID-19 corona virus pandemic.

When the month of November arrived, I had the honor of being invited to the residence of the United Kingdom ambassador, to attend an act of celebration on the occasion of Remembrance and War Veterans Day; It was a very nice sharing. Most of those who came to greet me showed signs of affection, implying something like "Even though we don't go to the church frequently, you are our parish priest". In the same way, in later days, we had "Remembrance Sunday and Veteran's Day" in the Church, a bilingual service that served to see again those who, for one reason or another, have not frequented the Church again.

Already in the month of December, focused a little more on children, we have proposed some activities for their religious formation, which they do with great joy when their school holidays arrive during the Advent and Christmas seasons; We also had the "Nine Lessons and Carols" with a brief sharing typical of the season, and which also served to meet people who have not attended Church. During this time I have also visited some sick people, to bring them the Word of God and comfort in their pain, both in their homes (being the most frequent in poor areas of Caracas) and in public and private hospitals, highlighting our neighbor the Tamanaco Clinic, better known as Urológico "San Román", children's area of the Oncological Hospital "Luis Razetti" and the Hospital "Vargas" of Caracas.

The most recurring activity continues to

be the attention to couples who come to want to get married, and find in our church a beauty and a peace that entraps them to celebrate there their sentimental union with the religious imprint, as well as the liturgical richness that they find at the attendance of our regular religious services; One of the couples contacted me through a family that I visited in El Hatillo. They were thinking of getting married in the gardens of a house, but they preferred our church, to which the Bridegroom donated the new light bulbs that light from the center of the Church.

Similarly, we have received invitations to pray at home, especially accompanying the Holy Rosary as a family, particularly in the face of the loss of a relative; Some of them sincerely stated that they turned to us given the closeness and familiarity they feel with our particular Church, something that they do not find in other congregations. part of these people have begun to attend Services in our Church.

We have pending visits to a nursing home located on the outskirts of the metropolitan area (El Hatillo Municipality), since they have not found anyone who will dedicate time to bring the Word of God and Communion to those who require it, emphasizing that it remains in an area difficult to access by public transport.

I have had great approach with the community of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, who rent the church to congregate on Saturdays, to which they have invited me to different celebrations that they have had.

I have also had the opportunity to share frequently with the support group Alcoholics Anonymous, which was the first to arrive in Venezuela, being brought by a priest of American origin; and that they supported us with the printing and placement of the notice that is at the entrance of the Church facilities (covering all those expenses themselves), which is why I took the opportunity to re-digitize and update the shields (both of the Church in Caracas



as of the Traditional Anglican Church) and take them to high resolution formats to be shown in high quality from now on, which has also served for documentation, the Sunday sheets that I prepare and the liturgical summaries that I publish in the different social networks .

Another medium-term project is scheduled for next July, when the son of one of the few people who attends our Religious Services in the Church, along with others represented, will have their High School Graduation; This promotion requested to have a Blessing for its achievement in this culminated stage, to carry out the act of delivery of titles in the spaces of the terrace that separates the church from the parish house, and the sharing of celebration in the multipurpose room located under the church; for which they promised to donate new light bulbs for the stairs, a cistern charge for the water tank, and some additional economic collaborations.

To continue having consecrated hosts and wine, I have relied on a priest brother of the Anglican Catholic Church, who has an established a mission in Caracas.

I have also restored pieces of table linen for liturgical use, such as: a cover for the body and a white chalice veil, a pall used to cover the chalice; just as I have placed colored ribbons to use the Common Prayer Book (white for Morning and Evening Prayer, red for Holy Communion, blue for Opening Prayer and readings, green for Psalms). All these expenses have been covered with the financial aid that I receive from the "International Anglican Fellowship".

Another long-term project is to digitize in its entirety the 1928 Common Prayer Book in Spanish, which I have been advancing each time I prepare the liturgical sheets and the aforementioned publications; and thus the virtual format will serve to share them with other Spanish-speaking communities, since only the English version is available

on the Internet. In addition to this, which is the most practical way to spread the message of the Gospel, and despite the fact that I share my sermons by sending them directly through WhatsApp, many people like my sermons; but there are still few who come to the Church to receive

Communion and listen to the mass in person. Our situation is still affected by the number of parishioners who once attended and collaborated in all the activities of the Church but are now no longer in Venezuela, greatly reducing the number of our parishioners.





# NEWS FROM INDONESIA

From Nanci Long:

As mentioned in our Christmas newsletter, the ministries in Indonesia are re-opening and re-imagining, post pandemic. Connecting on the ground this past November, encouraged our hearts and opened our eyes to new possibilities. Unexpected challenges can be met with increased faith as we watch what God is doing!

Of most immediate praise is the growth (in depth and scope) of the Farsi Worship Service. Early in its ministry, God opened doors for Providence Anglican Church to serve the refugee population in Indonesia, especially Farsi speakers from Afghanistan and Iran. Jim began a weekly Saturday night worship service with the sermon translated side by side into Farsi. Jim asked a few of the refugees who excelled in English to begin a written translation of the Anglican Morning and Evening Prayer, Holy Communion, and eventually the modern Anglican catechism into modern Farsi.

As worship went online during the pandemic, these translations served to launch PAC's first Farsi service in Indonesia, led by our Afghani brother that we will call "E." This group has begun meeting in person and looks forward to being recognized as an official Providence Anglican Church Mission Point! And as if this wasn't exciting enough, Brother E was just accepted into St. Bede's Seminary and will study online for his Bachelors of Divinity! Tuition for his first two classes has almost been covered and we are praying that more partners will come forward to help support Brother E's religious studies. In addition, we need to raise funds to rent a space for the Farsi Worship and help the refugees with transport and meals. Even now, as word of this Farsi Worship is spreading, we have been notified of an unexpected gift! We pray that your faith is strengthened as we testify of God's provision.

I asked him to tell his story, and it went back to his childhood when he was won't to watch movies about Jesus. He always felt a keen love and affection for our Lord as he watched. Kourosh, aided by our pastor Aan from Java, helped him on to the point of decision.

## *Stewards*

The IAF Steward program has been established as a management tool and communication link between the Board of Directors (specifically, the Executive Director) and members of various TAC churches and organizations. Working with the IAF Executive Director, Stewards (who are volunteers) assist the Board by maintaining contact with and funneling IAF related information to the churches and individuals in their home dioceses. This includes distribution of newsletters, collection of donated funds, and information concerning the IAF mission and planning goals. They also field questions regarding IAF operations and help identify candidates for the Sustaining Member Program. Currently, we are pleased to have seven active Stewards:
